Song: “I Will Follow”

Years ago, when my husband and I were in missionary training, one of the instructors gave me a handmade bookmark that read, “Where God guides, God provides.” It sounds like a trite little statement; but if you realize the truth behind those five words, there is nothing little about them. That saying was tested many times while we served in missions.

Often God guides us into situations where some sort of personal sacrifice is required. As with Abraham, it is God’s way of asking us, “Do you love Me above all?” The thing He asks us to sacrifice is always something important to us. If it is something we are comfortable giving up, we don’t depend on Him; we believe we have everything under control and that the sacrifice can be accomplished in our own strength.

So God, in His wisdom, often asks us to trust in Him for things that, to our finite minds, are inconceivable, even impossible. “Where God guides” will often make us uncomfortable. He does that because He loves us as a Father, to increase our trust in Him. Where He guides, He always provides.

Faith in the Face of Fear

[Rahab] had taken them up to the roof and hidden them under the stalks of flax she had laid out on the roof (Joshua 2:6).

Scripture: Joshua 2:1-7

Song: “No Longer Slaves”

Several of my greatest fears awaited me when we moved our family of six to Irian Jaya, Indonesia. At that time, the religious culture in Indonesia was 95 percent Islam. I feared religious persecution. Malaria, a mosquito-borne illness, is rampant there. I feared sickness and death. Some thought we were crazy, but we felt God’s call on our lives, and we followed that call—to go more than 9,000 miles away from home, family, and familiarity. It was the hardest thing I’ve ever done. I honestly feared that we’d go there with our four children and come back with three. Or two. Maybe none of us would come back!

I will never forget the sense of peace that washed over me the moment we arrived. It lasted the entire time we were there—through a political uprising and through several cases of malaria in my two youngest children. His peace covered me and clung to me like a shroud.

What fears are you facing today? Is God calling you to do something “crazy”? Something dangerous? Joshua’s young spies faced their fears as they entered Jericho. Rahab faced her fears as she hid the spies and redirected the king’s men. Through facing my fears, I learned that God’s grace and peace overpower all fear. He never leaves us or forsakes us (Hebrews 13:5).

Heavenly Father, Your perfect love casts out all fear. Help me to be obedient to Your call on my life, no matter what. In Jesus’ name, amen.

Love Mercy

“The master called the servant in. ‘You wicked servant,’ he said, ‘I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. Shouldn’t you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?’” (Matthew 18:32, 33).

Scripture: Matthew 18:23-35

Song: “Mercy”

The game of Mercy is played by two people who grasp each other’s hands with interlocked fingers. The goal is to twist the opponent’s hands until the opponent surrenders, yelling, “Mercy!”

True mercy is a difficult concept, especially for those who have never been shown mercy. To put it simply, mercy is undeserved pardon. It is deliverance from judgment. God’s mercy is demonstrated in His sparing us from what we deserve: eternal separation from His holiness because of the filthiness of our sin. In His unfathomable mercy, He sent His Son to take the penalty for our sin upon himself, saving us from the death we deserve.

Mercy is a requirement for His people. Micah 6:8 says, “What does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.”

How can mercy play out in your daily life? Be nice to mean people. Offer forgiveness freely, before it is asked for. Prefer others above yourself. Offer to pay the consequence for someone else. Instead of waiting for your “opponent” to beg for mercy, extend it freely, just as God the Father extended His mercy to you, while you were yet a sinner (Romans 5:8).

Father, when I think on Your great mercy, I am overcome with gratitude. Help me to extend mercy to others as You have to me. In Jesus’ name, amen.

Holy Living

I want you to stress these things, so that those who have trusted in God may be careful to devote themselves to doing what is good. These things are excellent and profitable for everyone (Titus 3:8).

Scripture: Titus 3:1, 2, 8-11

Song: “Take My Life and Let It Be”

I work with elementary school children, and each year I seem to learn the names of the “naughty kids” first. Why? Because they draw attention to themselves by their actions and require correction on a regular basis. “Even a child is known by his doings” (Proverbs 20:11, *KJV*). The “good kids” also stand out, and in a matter of weeks, the entire school knows who’s who.

God wants His children not only to *be* good but also to devote themselves to *doing* good. We are intended to stand out in this world for our actions and not to gain attention for ourselves or to become famous or puffed up over our goodness. Scripture tells us: “Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven” (Matthew 5:16).

Our society is getting darker. Instead of despairing, let us see that as an opportunity to shine brighter, giving more glory to God. We will stand out more and more as the world around us turns away from Him. Let us hold on tightly to His Word and devote ourselves to doing what is good—for His glory and for the sake of lighting the way for others to find hope.

The Center

These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up (Deuteronomy 6:6, 7).

Scripture: Deuteronomy 6:4-9

Song: “This Is the Air I Breathe”

Life on Earth depends on our position in relation to the Sun. If Earth were any closer to the Sun, our oceans would boil away. Conversely, if Earth was farther from the Sun, our blue planet would be white with ice. Either way, life would be destroyed. Scripture: James 2:8-13

Song: “Your Mercy”

The Christian who is truly committed to living for Jesus will live a life that is characterized by mercy and compassion.

Mercy understands that sin is sin. Mercy accepts the fact that I am no better than the “shadiest” of sinners I encounter as I go about my life. The only difference that matters is that as Christians, we have been forgiven, and by the grace of God, we have new hearts. “I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh” (Ezekiel 36:26). Mercy sees others through eyes of compassion. It shows kindness to those who are still wandering, lost in the darkness. It shows love to the undeserving—because we too are undeserving.

Are your relationships only with those who look and act like you? Is your ministry focused on people who are already saved? Jesus was drawn to people who needed Him. He touched leprosy victims, He spoke with compassion to prostitutes, He welcomed the despised into His presence. As sinners saved by His mercy, we are to extend that same mercy to others, no matter how much it stretches us out of our comfort zones.

Two Vitals

You see that a person is considered righteous by what they do and not by faith alone. . . . As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead (James 2:24, 26).

Scripture: James 2:14-26

Song: “Spirit of the Living God”

Most homes have a variety of appliances. Vacuum cleaners, dishwashers, ovens, washers, dryers . . . The list goes on. These modern inventions are not only useful; they are depended on to the point that we hardly know how we'd live without them. Nearly all appliances require two vital things: a power source and an operator.

So it is with Christians. We need a power source, which is the Spirit of God who lives within everyone who has been born again. We also need an operator. You can plug your vacuum cleaner in, but unless you direct it around the carpet, it will just sit there making noise. We can be filled with the Spirit and have all kinds of wonderful spiritual knowledge, but what use is it if we don't get moving? God wants to use us and has empowered us to do good works (Ephesians 2:10).

Think of a puppet. No matter how intricate or expensive it may be, the toy is limp and useless without your hand operating it. Let us not settle for being limp and useless Christians, but instead welcome God's Spirit to fill us, and His hand to guide us in everything we do, that our works may demonstrate our faith and glorify our Father in Heaven (Matthew 5:16).
