Standing on Truth in a World of Lies

The Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils (1 Timothy 4:1 *KJV*).

Scripture: 1 Timothy 4:1–5 **Song:** "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus"

Sometimes false teaching is obvious; sometimes it is not. Sometimes it's deceptive and comes through a personality we find appealing, attractive, and unassuming—someone we trust. We might see false beliefs creep into the lives of our friends or family members; or maybe we have our own experience with coming out of deception. In light of how clever some false teaching is, it is important for Christians to have biblical understanding, stand firm in it, and know how to articulate it.

Jesus told His disciples that the Holy Spirit would remind them of His words and ways (John 14:26). No Hiding from God

Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? . . . If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea; Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me. (Psalm 139:7, 9-10 KJV).

Scripture: Psalm 139:1–12 Song: "Seeking for Me"

Prominent theologian and preacher Jonathan Edwards (1703–1758) was known for his boldness in calling people to serious self-examination in light of God's Word. His sermons were strong appeals, reminders that spiritual decisions have eternal consequences. His desire was for people to receive salvation, draw near to God, and enjoy His presence as Edwards himself had come to do. He wrote, "It has often been my delight to approach God, and adore him as a sovereign God."

Psalm 139 reveals God's sovereignty: He is always with us, and no action, thought, or motive is hidden from Him. In Genesis 3, after Adam and Eve sinned in the garden and God asked Adam where he was, it wasn't because God did not know. God was calling Adam out of hiding and into His presence.

The encouragement here is that there is nothing we can or need to hide from God. He already knows us to our depths. When we belong to Him, we can know He is pursuing us, calling us to draw near. We've been saved from our sin, and He meets us, not with anger, but with mercy and sanctifying grace.

Father, thank You for pursuing me and saving me. I'm so grateful to be safe in Your presence. In Jesus' name, amen.

A Bold Assertion

Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting (Psalm 139:23–24 *KJV*).

Scripture: Psalm 139:13–24 Song: "Search Me, O God"

"No!" is a common irresolute reply from the mouth of my toddler. Sadly, all too often, I'm guilty of the same utterance and attitude. A journey through parenthood reveals how children quickly pick up on a parent's words and ways of being. Scripture: 1 Corinthians 6:12–20 Song: "Jesus Paid It All"
